




CGUHS: Science Department




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

CGUHS: Marine Corps JROTC

The Marine Corps JROTC cadets shared a glimpse of the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) curriculum which includes marksmanship, physical fitness, public speaking, land navigation/mountaineering, military history, customs and courtesy, leadership, first aid, close order drill, drug and alcohol awareness, current events, "real world" social skills, teamwork, and problem-solving techniques. This program is not combat oriented, nor is it a recruiting activity. The objective is to teach young adults to become informed and responsible citizens. develop leadership skills, strengthen character, and promote an understanding of the basic elements and requirements of national security. Additional objectives are to help students develop self-discipline, confidence, and integrity. Semi-annually, the unit travels to the West Coast so that cadets can receive "firsthand" knowledge of selected active U. S. Marine Corps units and their mission. Physical fitness through running, exercise, etc. is required weekly. Uniforms are issued and the required wear on weekly inspection days. Successful completion of JROTC Leadership I fulfills one (1) PE credit for high school graduation from the Casa Grande Union High School District.

CGUHS: Agriscience & FFA

Career & Technical Education (CTE) <u>Agriscience</u> and <u>FFA</u> shared their programs with guests. Agriscience covers leadership development, plant science, animal science, agriculture mechanics, business management, leadership practices, welding fundamentals, and metal cutting. Students are encouraged to complete this four-year program. Future Farmers of America (FFA) is an organization associated with this program.

Nielson Named U.S. Presidential Scholar Candidate

Aleena Nielson, Vista Grande High School, has been selected as one of five Arizona nominees for the 2021/22 U.S. Presidential Scholars in <u>Career and Technical Education (CTE)</u>. Aleena was selected by a review team consisting of CTE stakeholders based on evidence of academic rigor, technical competence, professional employability skills, ingenuity, and creativity. She was recognized by Cathy Raymond, Arizona State Director of CTE, on Tuesday, February 1, during the Casa Grande Union High School District (CGUHSD) Governing Board meeting.

All five nominees were selected by the Arizona Superintendent of Public Instruction, Kathy Hoffman, and submitted by her office to the Commission on Presidential Scholars at the U.S. Department of Education. As a semifinalist nominee, she was invited to apply for the National Review by the Commission on Presidential Scholars at the U.S. Department of Education. Twenty outstanding U.S. Presidential Scholars in Career and Technical Education students will be recognized in May 2022.

The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, by executive order of the President, to recognize and honor some of our nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. In 1979, the program was extended to recognize students who demonstrate exceptional talent in the visual, creative, and performing arts. In 2015, the program was again extended to recognize students who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in Career and Technical Education fields. Each year, up to 161 students are named as Presidential Scholars, one of the nation's highest honors for high school students. 


CTE Engineering I

CGUHS Career & Technical Education (CTE) <u>Engineering I</u> students shared, with the combined engineering classes, what they have learned in the introductory lessons to their chosen engineering discipline. Ella, Computer Engineer, shared her recently gained knowledge of binary numbers, Boolean Algebra, and basic TTL logic gates, and how to derive design equations from truth tables, use those equations to create schematic drawings, and implement those schematics as physical circuits. Melody, Imagineering, shared the role of Imagineers in creating the rides and attractions that we enjoy at the Disney theme parks and some of the types of problems that Imagineers are called upon to solve. Sophia, Industrial Engineer, shared what she has learned in her introduction to project teams and formal problem-solving techniques used in the workplace. Each student shared information for five to ten minutes then responded to questions from the upper-class students. Engineering students regularly do this type of presentation exercise

to help them organize and summarize their learning and communicate that learning to their colleagues. Students also learn valuable soft skills such as public speaking, succinct slide deck creation, and thinking on-their-feet in response to questions from their peers. The students are receiving a more personalized experience by investigating and learning about topics that interest them within the constraints of the Arizona CTE Engineering curriculum standards. The Cougars are taught by John Morris, CTE Engineering/ Mathematics Teacher.





A Computer Engineer in the Making

This semester, Engineering I student Ella Barth (2023) will begin working on a course of study being designed as a prototype for a course in Computer Engineering. This course will include much of the same curriculum content as is included in the first two years of a computer engineering major at the university level.

After a brief introduction to electrical theory and analysis, Ella will investigate topics including Digital Design Fundamentals, Computer Architecture and Organization, and VHDL. She will also learn to design printed circuit boards (PCBs) and to program in the C programming language. Hands-on projects will include designing and implementing an ATMega 328 based PCB microcontroller board; designing, implementing, and testing logic circuits using discrete transistors; designing and implementing combinational and sequential circuits using discrete logic devices; and designing and implementing a simple computer designed in VHDL onto an FGPA device. In future semesters, more advanced topics will include assembly language programming, communication protocols, computer networks, and embedded systems. This project will become a multi-year project with the intent of preparing Ella and following students for further studies in computer engineering at the university level.

This curriculum follows courses in Computer Aided Design, Fundamentals of Fabrication and Manufacturing, and Introduction to Engineering (ASU FSE 100 equivalent). The Engineering curriculum at CGUHS is aligned to the Arizona Department of Education's Career & Technical Education Standards for Engineering and the SkillsUSA Technical Standards for Engineering Design.

Guest Lecture: ASU Youth Leadership Conference

On Thursday, January 13, during fourth period at Vista Grande High School, Pat Stolze, the Chairman of The Military Order of World Wars (MOWW), a retired Army Lieutenant Colonel, and a retired JROTC instructor, informed students of an opportunity with the MOWW to attend a leadership camp this summer at Arizona State University (ASU). The camp allows students to spend a week on the campus of ASU West in Glendale, Arizona, where the curriculum focuses on citizenship and leadership. Mr. Stolze explained to 10th and 11th grade students about the uniqueness of this opportunity, and its learning and enrichment value. The camp, which typically costs \$450, is an all-expense paid learning opportunity for interested students. 




Clubs Host Career Talk






